“MY JOURNEY”

PAIN AND EMPATHY: When my father died, it was the worst thing that had ever happened to me in my life. I was only 31 years old and had two children. My daughter was in school, but my son was only an 18 month old baby. I would sit in my rocking chair in the living room almost motionless for long periods of time. I fed and dressed my son, and was able to dress and feed myself, but I did little else. What minimal housework I did took me much longer than usual to accomplish, because my sad thoughts and feelings of loss interfered with everything I did, and kept me from concentrating.

As the fog of grief began to lift, and I became more aware of the awful feelings that were stirring inside me, I can remember making my husband’s and my bed one morning wondering why I had to go through this. Why did I have to suffer like this day after day? And I remember realizing, as I smoothed the yellow flowered quilt on our bed, the answer. The reason was so that I would know how other people felt when they went through the same experience. If this grief weren’t such a long, difficult and painful process, I would never remember it so vividly. If I didn’t experience the sense of weight on my shoulders so strongly, I would not be able to empathize with others who were going through the same sensation.

I didn’t know then, that 5 years later, I would be working in a hospital with patients and families that were grieving. I didn’t know then the very reasons my father gave up on life; his sense of loss and guilt over having to make all the decisions in my mother’s cancer treatment, would be the very same issue some of the people that I worked with would have. I could understand their pain and suffering because of my own. I was

an Oncology Social Worker, my job was to assist patients and families who were dealing with the sad and terribly difficult decisions that accompany diagnosis and treatment of cancer. Now it felt like a privilege to have known that pain, because time and again the people I worked with told me that I helped them to understand and deal with theirs.

In retrospect I realize that if I myself had not gone through the horrible pain of losing a family member to cancer and seeing the ravages it caused in a loved one, I would never have been able to understand so completely, so viscerally, the effects of the disease or the torment of the grief that accompanies it. On May 18, 1973, my mother died of cancer. On May 18, 1983, ten years to the day of my mother’s death; I received a letter of thanks and appreciation from the American Cancer Society, for facilitating a session of their “I Can Cope” series of education and support groups. I felt at that moment as though there was divine purpose and meaning not only to the work I was doing but guiding my entire life. I had been a Social Worker for less than 10 years at that time, but I felt certain that God was leading and supporting me through the unknown and difficult portions of this career. With God’s help, I could continue to help others find a better quality of life through an understanding and acceptance of the events and emotions they were bringing to me in their need.

Now that I am retired, I look back on a career that included working with people with HIV/AIDS, Psychiatric Social Work with abused and neglected children and their families, Emergency Room Social Work, and teaching Social Work. Through it all, I repeatedly felt as though the only way I was able to help and succeed was with the help of our loving and uplifting God, who answered my prayers time and again, and continues to be a source of strength and hope in my life.

He is a dear man and one only has to look at the way he reacts with his wife to see that he is a loving man also. He tries to appear stern but there is always a twinkle in his eye and now and then he offers a joke **to get** us all laughing. We were all privileged recently to watch Eldon and Ellen as their great grandchild was baptized here in our Sanctuary. It brought a tear to my eyes. Thank you Eldon and Ellen for being such an important part of our church family.

Endowment Committee Update

David Malaby, long time member of the Endowment Committee, has resigned from the Endowment Committee due to health reasons. He conveyed that his "experience with the committee has been great. The people are great to work with and I hope to get back to helping the church again in the near future." The committee will miss David for his time and talent in building the Endowment Fund and his tireless coordination of the Birthday Blessings program, an annual appeal to church members to celebrate their birthday with a gift to Spring Hill United Church of Christ. Thank you David for all you have done for the committee and the church!

The Endowment Committee has met regularly since January and has new Endowment Fund Committee operating guidelines in line with the new Church by-laws and written goals and objectives for 2011 – 12.

The Chair attended the June 21 Church Council meeting to update the council members on the Endowment Committee activities and request an appointment to the committee to replace the

vacancy left by David Malaby's resignation. The council members reviewed the Endowment Committee Goals: Increase Endowment Fund Contributions and Revenue; Increase awareness and understanding of the Endowment Fund and its mission; and develop a budget. They learned that the Endowment Committee was working on several strategies to accomplish the goals and were presented with a draft Planned Giving campaign for Spring Hill United Church of Christ, a Donor Bill of Rights to be adopted by the church and its fundraising missions, and approval to move forward with a plan to enhance the Maya Wolter Memorial Garden with engraved brick pavers paying tribute and homage to members and loved ones.

It was a positive meeting and set the course to move forward! The Endowment Committee is now poised to build on what others have done before and ensure that Spring Hill United Church of Christ is financially sound and sustainable for generations to come. We have much to do before Fall and the launching of our planned giving program and brick paver memorial walkway!

DIACONATE MINISTRY

Our Prayer Shawl Ministry is expanding in two ways: new knitters and crocheters have been added to our faithful core of people — Maxine Calise, Vera Werthwein, and Gail Calvi-MacConnell. The blessing of giving and receiving the shawls is extending beyond Spring Hill. Two shawls have been sent to recipients out of state, and others will follow. Our genuine thanks to those who prepare these gifts of love. You may be sure that they bring delight to those who receive them. This ministry is very rewarding to all of us.

As chair of the Share the Care ministry, Ellen Niemann has prepared a list of hosts and guests to be used when temporary housing becomes necessary during a time of emergency.

At our last meeting the name of one family was added to our list of regular contacts.

Transportation was arranged for two older parishioners to attend Sunday worship services.

Interest in becoming a part of the diaconate has been expressed by recent new members of the congregation. Names will be submitted to the church Council for approval at a later date.

The mid-summer observance of Holy Communion will take place on the first Sunday in August, the 7th, at the regular worship service.

It was voted to omit the July meeting of this ministry. The next meeting will be on Tuesday, August

9th at 4:30 p.m.

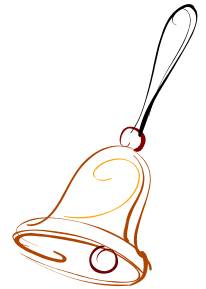

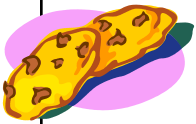
FOOTSTEPS TO SCHOOL SNEAKER PROJECT SHOES FOR NEEDY KIDS

Getting one's children ready for school will be a hardship for families in poverty. There is the extra cost of school uniforms/and or needed clothing, school supplies, physicals, shoes, socks, and underwear. Last year we learned that there were children that weren't in attendance when school started; they had no shoes, and we heard from teachers about children coming to school with worn out and ill fitted shoes. Although there are some places to get help with clothing, uniforms, school supplies, and physicals, there is no place to get shoes; therefore, once again we will be providing back to school shoes and socks for needy children.

You can help in one of two ways: From July 24 – August 28 you will see a display board in the Narthex. Upon the board will be a variety of "shoe tags" listing the name, age, sex, and shoe size of a needy child within the UF Nurturing Program or a needed size for the Hernando County School Board storage portable. The portable stores a variety of needed items for homeless/needy children within Hernando County.

When you select a "shoe tag" you will be asked to purchase a pair of sneakers and if possible a package of socks for said child, or you can give a monetary donation and our subcommittee will make the purchase for you. All purchases can be brought to the church at anytime; a special container to collect the donations will be in the Narthex. Please make sure that you attach your "shoe tag" to your purchase.

In the past I have had the chance to personally give your donations to the children and their families, thankfulness and joy were abundant, your generosity is appreciated by the families and especially the children! 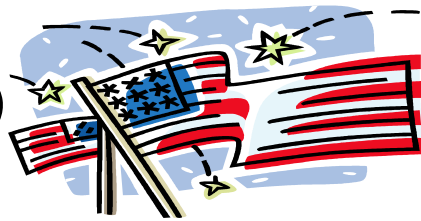
- A song fest was held at the Methodist church Wednesday.
