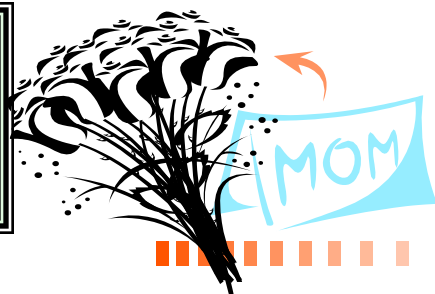

**THE PASTOR'S THOUGHTS....**

Dear Family of faith,

I believe in evolution!...or more accurately said, "I believe that evolution is a theory which helps explain a lot of things in this world." Having said that though, I do agree that Pope Benedict had a point when he said in his Easter Vigil homily last Saturday that it is a mistake to think that at some time "in some tiny corner of the cosmos there evolved randomly some species of living being capable of reasoning and trying to find rationality within creation, or to bring rationality into it....If human beings [lit. man] were merely a random product of evolution in some place on the margins of the universe, then [his] life would make no sense or might even be a chance of nature, but no, reason is there at the beginning: creative, divine reason."

For me personally, I have no problem with an even more far-reaching view of evolution than the Pope. I can accept the randomness of evolutionary development at the DNA level. And I don't think that the concept of Intelligent Design (the idea that God breaks into the evolutionary process to make "corrections" periodically) really does justice to the magnificence of God's creation. Even so, I do agree with my brother in the faith that there was Divine Reason behind our humanity. Let me tell you my most recent experience that makes me believe that.

On Sunday evening, April 17<sup>th</sup>, Jill and I had the privilege of attending the Florida Orchestra performance at Ruth Eckerd Hall in Clearwater. That particular evening I was mesmerized by pianist Lilya Zilberstein's performance of Rachmaninoff's Piano Concerto No. 3. The Moscow native who currently lives in Germany was captivating, to say the least. She performed flawlessly from memory the grandest of melodies with fingers flying over the keys and dynamics that swept us away into emotional ecstasy—the result of which was an immediate standing ovation

from the audience when she had played the last note and four curtain calls to an appreciative crowd that didn't want to quit. As she was playing the Russian composer's concerto, I was awestruck thinking about all that was happening before me on the stage: a Russian-born woman just two days shy of her 46<sup>th</sup> birthday with a fantastic memory, perfect technique and a gargantuan reservoir of emotion, playing a magnificent piece of music composed by a giant of Russian Romanticism whose own compositions stunned audiences more than a century ago, and performing the piece on an exquisite instrument (Steinway Grand) that is the finest in the world today. Then there was the orchestra and all the musicians who were capable of accompanying the soloist with their equally-fine musical instruments (no doubt some Stradivarius violins among them). As I pondered all the intelligence, all the artistry, all the soul and stamina, all the spirit that was represented on that stage in a single city on that single night; I thought to myself: "Accidental freak of nature? I think not!" Not only that, you see, but I and the hundreds of admiring listeners also had to bring to the musical extravaganza an appreciation for something that has nothing to do with "survival of the fittest." In other words, being captivated by Rachmaninoff's music performed by Lilya Zilberstein came from lofty aspirations so much greater than a base impulse just to stay alive. Somewhere in the distant past, somehow in ways we will never fully understand, a Divine Spirit set in motion the processes that resulted in that fabulous night at the symphony. That Divine Spirit is God, the same God who raised Jesus Christ from death and promises the same to us. Talk about a symphony of life! Life is all around us every day. I encourage you to recapture the ability to wonder at it—to wonder at what a stunning world we live in, and especially to marvel at the life that you and all that is around you enjoy.

By the time you read this we will have shared in a Seder meal served in Fellowship Hall on Maundy Thursday, April 21, at 6:00 p.m. The Seder is the traditional meal enjoyed by Jewish families on the first night of Passover, which celebrates the Exodus of Jews from slavery in Egypt. We appreciate the efforts of Pastor Carlan and Jill in planning and preparing this meal with its traditional foods to enable us to celebrate this significant event in the life of our Jewish friends.

Beginning with Easter Sunday the Communion bread will be handmade by Bruce Rafnell. He has graciously prepared a generous supply which will be stored in our church freezer. We are grateful to Bruce for this special gift to our church.

The observances of Holy Communion in our church for the balance of the calendar year are as follows:

- June 12—Pentecost—the traditional color is Red.

- August 7—Midway between Pentecost and World Communion Sunday
- October 2—World Communion Sunday
- November 27—First Sunday of Advent
- December 25—Christmas Day

Following is an excerpt from Sermons, by Peter Gomes:

“Paul Tillich once said that the saint is a saint not because he is good, but because he is transparent for something that is more than himself. Being a window of opportunity, being a means of grace, being the place in which the Holy Spirit makes its dwelling, is the vocation of ordinary people. That is why shepherds are summoned to the manger, that is why women are summoned to the tomb on resurrection morning, that is why fisherfolk and the most ordinary of ordinary people around are summoned into the vanguard of Jesus' movement, so that through them, through us, Christ might be seen and known. This is the continuing miracle of Easter. Not so much that Jesus Christ rose from the dead but that you and I may rise from the death in which we now find ourselves, and become in our ordinary lives beings of extraordinary witness to Christ so that in addition to the ample silver and gold that we all have, we may give something that the world needs: power and the love of the risen, living Savior Jesus Christ. That is the vocation of ordinary people, and it happens to people just like ourselves.”

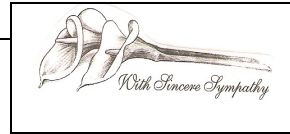

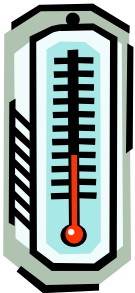

**STATEMENT OF SUPPORT OF TRANSGENDER PERSONS  
Spring Hill United Church of Christ, Spring Hill, FL**

Because Jesus calls us to offer hospitality to all who are created in the image of God (Matthew 5: 46-47),

Because Jesus proclaimed that he was sent to proclaim release to the captives, recovery of sight to the blind, and let the oppressed go free (Luke 4:18),

Because Jesus taught that others will know we are his disciples by the love we have for one another (John 13:35),

Because the Apostle Paul taught that there is no longer male nor female in the realm of God, but all are one in Christ (Galatians 3:28),

Because people of all gender identity were welcome in the Christian family (Acts 8: 26-40),

Because the Twenty-fourth General Synod of the United Church of Christ passed a resolution encouraging all member congregations to welcome transgender people into membership, ministry, and full participation,

Because the Florida Conference adopted a resolution in 2010 encouraging all congregations to offer full participation in ministry to people without regard to sexual orientation or gender identity or expression,

Because our own congregation on March 22, 2009, adopted a Statement of Inclusiveness that states our welcome and affirmation of all people, including people of every sexual identity,

Because four out of five congregations in our United Church of Christ still do not openly welcome transgender persons (according to the UCC Coalition for LGBT Concerns),

Because discrimination still exists for transgender people in areas of insurance coverage, housing, employment, medical treatment, and military service,

Because transgender persons continue to struggle to be accepted by both the homosexual and heterosexual communities,

Because we have within our own denomination and within our own congregation, persons who identify themselves as transgender persons,

We, the people of Spring Hill United Church of Christ, publicly affirm our support for and affirmation of transgender people and those of every gender identity.

Furthermore, we commit ourselves individually, and as a congregation,

- to work to educate ourselves and others about the issues of transgender people
- to become more sensitive to the challenges facing transgender people
- to work for justice for transgender people in those areas of society where they are discriminated against
- to seek out personal relationships of support with transgender people
- to call others to accept and welcome transgender people in their lives and churches
- to keep open all aspects of church life to transgender people in our own faith community
- to support transgender youth in their struggle of gender identity

We pray that God will continue to open our hearts and minds to listening to the truth and to walk with us on our journey toward accepting all people.

## **BE PART OF GENERAL SYNOD 28**



The Florida Conference is hosting General Synod in Tampa, July 1-5, 2011. Synod meets every two years and is a gathering of people delegated by our 38 Conferences to represent the United Church of Christ and to address important matters relating to the church. Participants also include visitors from UCC churches; local, conference and national UCC staff; representatives from many diverse UCC institutions, agencies and ministries; and friends and colleagues from other faith traditions. It is an opportunity to participate in meaningful worship, see how the UCC works from the inside out, hear dynamic speakers, renew old friendships and make new friends, and celebrate the various UCC institutions, agencies and ministries.

**Be a part of this as a Synod volunteer.** Volunteers are asked to commit to one or more four-hour shifts. Everyone who attends Synod must register and pay a registration fee. The fee for a volunteer is \$100 (50% of the regular registration fee and entitles you to attend all activities and events, except those that are only open to delegates).

Here are some of the ways Synod volunteers will assist:

- Staff information booth at the Convention Center and hotels
- Assist Registrar of General Synod at the registration area
- Floor Stewards assist in floor management of Synod sessions
- Youth Stewards (14 – 18 years old) help during all plenary sessions
- Assist participants with special needs to fully participate in the activities Synod
- Children's Program and Child Care volunteers provide child care for infants through 5<sup>th</sup> graders
- Worship Ushers
