## My Journey

I believe God is speaking to me when I have a "gut" feeling that something (good or bad) is about to happen. The kids and I lived near a street that had two hospitals within 15 or 16 blocks of each other and emergency vehicles were constantly going up and down the street. After awhile I paid little attention to them. All that changed the night of January 31, 1968. The emergency vehicles stopped about 6 blocks from the house and I knew at that moment that something had happened to one of my kids. My daughter, Cindy, had been hit by a car. My life and the lives of my children were to change forever. Cindy was 17 years old. That night Cindy and two other kids were crossing the street and almost reached the curb when a car came speeding down the wrong side of the street. One of the kids jumped out of the way, but it was too late for Cindy. She was hit and dragged 168 feet (a city block) and was trapped under the wheel. The jaws of life were used to free her. The only good thing that happened that night (if you can call it good) was that Cindy was unconscious the minute the car hit her. Cindy died two days later, on February 2, 1968. Her skull was fractured in two places, an arm and a leg were broken and she had massive internal injuries. My daughter died because the 16 year old brother of her best friend was on drugs and decided to get behind the wheel of a car. Linda, not only lost a sister she lost her best friend.

Cindy was a great kid, had a great sense of humor (she got that from me), and loved life! When you were around her you couldn't help but feel happy. She was a Girl Scout, member of the Catholic Youth Group and pitcher on the *Lassie League* team. The kids liked to

tease her and called her "Sam". She was smart and had a big heart – she would give her money to anyone that needed it. She loved the church and spent a great deal of time with her favorite nun. One night after a night of tobogganing the kids came back to my house. Her boyfriend, Frannie, fell asleep on the couch and Cindy shaved one of his legs. Cindy and Frannie had a special relationship, her favorite flower was the rose. There didn't need to be a special occasion for him to send her a bouquet of yellow roses. On the day of the funeral, he had a blanket of red and white roses sent to the funeral home. It was so heavy it had to be hung from a doorway. Frannie's mother wrote me (after more than 30 years) that he had passed away from a brain tumor, at the age of 45. He never got over Cindy's death and never dated again.

I don't like to talk about my marriage. I had shared an experience that I had with Pastor Carlan, and he suggested that it may help someone else. I finally got tired of the name calling and the death threats. So, on the way to work one night, I stopped at my lawyer's office to file divorce papers. I don't know how my husband knew where I was, but he did. He called me and said "They are going to find you floating in the river". All I can remember of that night was standing at the edge of a body of water and starting to walk in...all of a sudden I felt a hand on my shoulder. I turned around but there was no one there.

My son, Wayne, lived in Alexandria, Virginia. He lived alone and worked from home as a CPA. One night around Thanksgiving of 1998, I was sound asleep when I heard a voice say "I love you mom". We were notified around December 9<sup>th</sup> that Wayne's body had been found in his apartment. The autopsy showed he died around Thanksgiving from

complications of diabetes. He was 45 years old.

I thank God for my kids and the great memories I have. I wouldn't trade those memories for a million dollars. I truly believe that no matter how angry you are with God and wish He would get lost....He never leaves your side.

As I was writing this, I remembered that shortly after the accident happened, the local T.V. station stated that the accident was the first of that year. How different the news was handled then and now. No reporters were at my door sticking a mike in my face. All they did was call the house and offer their condolences.

After everything that happened in my life, never in my wildest imagination would I ever have believed the fantastic future that lay ahead. One of which was the opportunity to work with the White House Communication Agency.

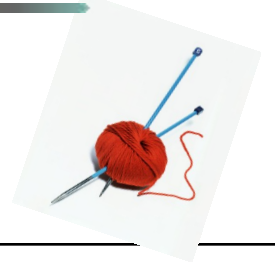

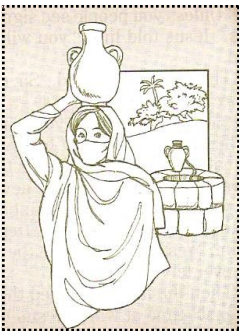

Women at the Well: A Women's Weekly Study Group

Jesus says to the woman at the well, "...whoever drinks of the water that I shall give him will never thirst..." The woman responds, "Sir, give me this water that I may not thirst..." John 4.

As Christians we all desire a deeper and more meaningful relationship with God, and thirst for this "living water." But, too often, we feel like we never quite made it to the well, or perhaps we got there, but found we had no bucket, or we let down our buckets only to find them coming up empty or with hardly a drop of this living water, so we walk away discouraged and unquenched. There are guides and tools that can help us to get to the well and to discern the signs of "living water" that is all around us. I invite all women to join me on Tuesday mornings as we explore a variety of the time honored spiritual disciplines. Each week we will focus on a particular discipline- such as: The inward disciplines of meditation, prayer, fasting, and study; the outward disciplines of simplicity, solitude, submission, and service; the corporate disciplines of confession, guidance, celebration, and worship. A chosen excerpt from a particular spiritual master (author) from the "Spiritual Classics" will be read. The reading will include an appropriate Bible passage followed by discussion questions and suggested individual/group exercises.

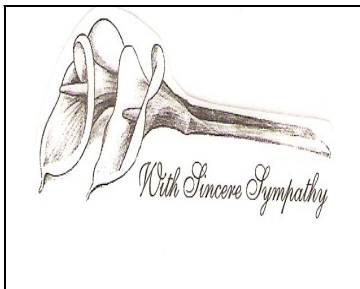
